Health Corner Statement

National Minority Health Month is observed every April by the Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Minority Health (OMH). This observance highlights the importance of reducing disparities and improving the health of racial and ethnic minorities.



The theme for April 2022, "Give Your Community a Boost!" will focus on the continued importance of COVID-19 vaccinations, including boosters, as one of the strongest tools we have to end the COVID-19 pandemic which has disproportionately affected communities of color. The theme supplements the CDC recommendations to prevent COVID transmissions, such as physical distancing, use of well-fitting masks, adequate ventilation and avoidance of crowded indoor spaces.

Contributing factors of experiences with racism and discrimination lead to mistrust of the healthcare system among racial and ethnic minority groups, which in turn leads to mistrust of factual information on vaccines and boosters.

This theme supports the U.S. Surgeon General's recommendations on combating COVID-19 and vaccine misinformation at the individual, community, and organizational levels.




ABAA: What are your plans on giving back to the community?

A Black Soldier's Letters Home



During Black History month, the St. Louis CBS affiliate, KMOV-4, aired a feature story on the father of ABAA board members - James 'Jim' Killion III, Carol (Killion) Hudson, Dr. Cheryl Killion, and Michele (Killion) Keeper. Their dad, **James Killion, Jr.**, was one of 1.2 million Black soldiers serving overseas during World War II. An Alton native, he left behind a detailed account of his time in the military in the form of 47 letters which Jim III put together in book form, "A Black Soldier's Letters Home".

Now, the National World War II Museum in New Orleans will add them to its history archive. "Our mission is to collect stories of the American experience in WWII," said Kim Guise, Senior Curator of the museum. "There is a much larger story than just that of the white soldiers. Black Americans are and always have been part of that story. Letters from Black servicemen are guite rare within our collection."

Because of Mr. Killion's legacy of service to the community, breaking of several inhibiting color barriers and general spirit of leadership, the former Salu Park was re-named, James H Killion Park and dedicated in his honor.
